E-STEAM

Sarah Aylsworth and Amanda Heidemann

What do you get when you combine two sunny personalities with first-rate solar energy research? Classrooms that shine with real-world math application, remarkable student ingenuity, and collaboration across grade levels. When math teachers Sarah Aylsworth (fifth grade) and Amanda Heidemann (fourth grade) put their heads together on the fourth grade’s year-end math project—the design and construction of scaled model houses featuring solar energy components—a lightbulb went off. Why not visit the heralded Hawai’i Preparatory Academy Energy Lab, a top student-centric research and collaborative education facility? The first zero-energy, -water, and -waste school building in the world, the Energy Lab will offer our St. Francis educators a direct view into efforts to create a healthier planet. This knowledge will, in turn, inspire our students to calculate volume and conversions, collect data, and graph solutions for energy-efficient models worthy of Hawaii’s sunny shores.



ENGLISH

Morrie Bogrand and Carol Bedard

Honoring seventh- and eighth-grade curricula rich in the grand works of Shakespeare, Dickens, and Chaucer, English teachers Carol Bedard and Morrie Bogrand will travel to England to “reincarnate” these literary giants. Between strolling the streets of London and taking in performances at The Globe Theatre and the Royal Shakespeare Company, the two will attend the Globe Theatre Teacher’s Workshop on Shakespeare and visit the Charles Dickens Museum. Through exploration of Shakespeare’s immense body of work and a glimpse at the world’s largest collection of Dickens artifacts, Mrs. Bedard and Mr. Bogrand will gain an insider’s feel of the period’s political, cultural, and religious influences. Stepping further back in time, they will venture to the countryside of Canterbury and Oxford, where a Medieval Walking Tour, plus stops at Leeds Castle and the White Cliffs of Dover, will punctuate their peek into the Middle Ages, when Chaucer lived and wrote in this bustling center of learning.



MISSION WORK

Carol Kemper

Jumping at the chance to “be a blessing and show God’s love to children in need,” Primary I teacher assistant Carol Kemper will travel with Chapelwood Methodist Church this summer for a *Mission on the Move* trip to Tapachula, Mexico. There, Ms. Kemper will spend a week ministering at a home for children whose parents are in prison and orphans pulled from street life—helping to break generational ties to oppression, poverty, and crime. Through art activities, play, and worship, Ms. Kemper will not only share the love of Christ with these children, but also offer the home’s regular care providers a much-needed rest. She will then bring the lessons learned from her trip back to St. Francis in the form of a slide show and presentation shared with Primary School colleagues and Lower School faculty and students.



MATH

Holly Plost

Ask Technology/Math Specialist Holly Plost how to motivate kids to (gasp!) enjoy math, and she’ll tell you it’s all in their *mindset*. Fueled by Dr. Carol Dweck’s research-based model—supporting the potential of a “growth mindset” versus the stagnation of a “fixed mindset”—St. Francis has worked to encourage a growth mindset among faculty, staff, and students for a number of years. Now, Mrs. Plost will head to Stanford University for a two-day workshop on “Teaching Mindset Mathematics” led by Dr. Jo Boaler, a Stanford mathematics professor, researcher, and author. The event will highlight the role mindset plays in determining success and failure, with an emphasis on helping students embrace challenge as an opportunity to learn and improve, rather than avoiding it due to potential failure. Mrs. Plost currently leads a campus book study covering Dr. Boaler’s book, *Mathematical Mindsets*, and plans to return from Stanford armed with further research for teaching mindset resiliency in math and beyond!



SPANISH

Mercedes Perli and Maria Capecchi

Lower School Spanish teachers Maria Capecchi and Mercedes Perli believe that learning a language should entail not only *instruction* in a classroom, but also *immersion* in a culture. Indeed, research suggests that when teachers educate students on the food, music, dance, artists, and traditions of a country, the more engaging that education becomes. Thanks to an upcoming trip to Malaga, Spain, this language-loving team will brush up on the life and times of Pablo Picasso (introduced in the fourth-grade curriculum) through trips to The Picasso Museum and the artist’s childhood home. They’ll add in a local cooking class, roam through a popular market, and take in a *tablaó flamenco* (traditional flamenco performance) as well. After unpacking their stories, videos, and pictures, Ms. Capecchi and Mrs. Perli plan to create classroom displays highlighting the marvels of Malaga. *Olé!*
