Mr. Schiller will travel to Uzbekistan for an eleven-day tour of the original Silk Road route and outposts, including visits with local Uzbeks, sight-seeing in key towns, strolls through lively bazaar markets—and even an overnight stay in a Yurt tent akin to those of the nomadic people of the region. After this immersion in the sights, sounds, and flavors of a bygone time, Mr. Schiller will bring back the stories and artifacts that embody the spirit of the Silk Road.


Monica Masini, Lauretta DuByne, Nancy Pettiette, Julie Grantham

As if attending the U.S. Lacrosse Convention—the nation's largest educational event for coaches and officials—won't be rewarding enough, Girls Lacrosse Coach Ron Robinson is kicking his game up a notch. While in Baltimore for the three-day



event, Mr. Robinson will also spend two days on the campus of Johns Hopkins University, home to one of the premier lacrosse programs in the nation. Through observation, practice videos, and visits with top players and coaching staff, he will gain firsthand insight into the inner workings of the lacrosse powerhouse. He'll then build on this knowledge at the USL convention, learning from top minds in the game via clinics, seminars, and networking. With an eye to a future that includes a

St. Francis Upper School, Mr. Robinson plans to model our school program after the greats, building the lacrosse athlete's all-around skill, character, and self-esteem.

SPANISH Brooke Dawson

Here's a little-known fact: Seventh-grade Spanish teacher Brooke Dawson was first introduced to Spanish as a student at St. Francis. What began in the classroom of Señora Sasso years ago has today blossomed into a



devotion to the language, culture, and study of Spain. To this end, Ms. Dawson will travel to Madrid and Seville, Spain, for an eight-day immersion trip this summer. Five days in Madrid will include a week-long intensive Spanish course at the don Quijote School, and her time in both cities will comprise visits to famous landmarks and life among the people and places that define the culture. Ms. Dawson will bring back to her St. Francis peers the best-practice teaching methods learned at the don Quijote School—and to her students a vibrant account of what makes Spain so very special.

MATH Sarah Powell

Statistical analysis. Data gathering. Problem solving. Polar bears? Thanks to the ingenuity of Canada's Churchill Northern Studies Centre, Sarah Powell will have the opportunity to experience all four during one memorable week on the banks



of Hudson Bay in Manitoba. As part of an active research team, Mrs. Powell will collect scientific data during a brief window in the annual migration of the polar bears through Churchill. She'll also hang on for a helicopter tour of the coastline and a dog-sledding trip around the region. The eighth-grade math teacher, who admits to a lifelong fascination with polar bears, plans to tap her adventures back in the classroom through project-based learning that incorporates data, spread sheets, and predictions, adding, "I'll get those kids to love polar bears, too!"
