

Amy Jones, Lyndsay Sweeney



YOGA

In her eight years as a St. Francis Lower School teacher, Mrs. Smith has helped her students learn to appreciate the value of exercising their minds and their bodies. The former St. Francis track and cross-country coach and Girls on the Run mentor is also an avid runner and yoga practitioner on her own time, and her recent Woolrich Award will fuel her ability to share the benefits of yoga with St. Francis students. Research shows that yoga benefits students by improving focus, attention span, and concentration; relieving tension, stress, and anxiety; and helping to strengthen collaboration and civic and social awareness. To bring these benefits to St. Francis students, Mrs. Smith will be attending a Houston-based training session through Yogiños called Yoga in Schools: Mindfulness and Movement Across the Curriculum; will become certified as a children's yoga teacher through Rainbow Kids Yoga in Boulder, Colorado; and will learn more about integrating yoga and mindfulness techniques in the classroom through the online Yoga4Classrooms course.
