## **2019-20 School Supplies: Online Ordering Now Available**

School supplies may now be ordered online for the 2019–20 school year. Visit [www.educationalproducts.com/shoppacks](http://www.educationalproducts.com/shoppacks), and enter your division's ID code in the box provided:

- To order a school supply pack for a student in LOWER SCHOOL, enter the code STF001.
- To order a school supply pack for a student in MIDDLE SCHOOL, enter the code STF018.
- To order a school supply pack for a student in UPPER SCHOOL (grades 9 and 10 will use the same supply list), enter the code STF079.

**Please note:**

- *Incoming third and fourth graders will need to purchase a 2-inch three-ring zipper binder for the 2019-20 school year (if they don't already own one).*
- *Incoming seventh, eighth, ninth, and tenth graders must have a TI-84 graphing calculator for the 2019–20 school year. If you don't already own one, you will want to purchase the newest model, the TI-84 Plus CE graphing calculator. The TI-84 Plus CE is approximately \$135-\$165.*
- *Similarly, incoming sixth graders will need to purchase a TI-30Xa scientific calculator for the 2019–20 school year if they don't already own one. These are approximately \$12-\$15.*

**CANCELLATION**

The June 3-6 section of our SOTP volleyball camp is cancelled, due to construction on the Crum Athletics Center gym floor. The July 29-August 2 section will continue as planned.

## ADDITIONS

- **Edible Art (June 10-14; 9:00 a.m.-12:00 p.m.)**—In this fun camp with Maria Cruzalegui-Reardon, students will look at food as art. They'll decorate cakes and cupcakes, work with dough, and cut fruits and vegetables to create edible works of art, while also developing fine motor skills, practicing measurements, and gaining hands-on understanding of some kitchen chemistry.
- **Additional STEAM Camps With Kara Cooney-Galli (July 22-26)**
  - **Super Hero Training Academy (1:00-2:30 p.m.; grades K-3)**—Join us as we test our X-ray vision, create some delicious kryptonite to use against the bad guys, eat some super-power cupcakes, and test our web-shooting skills at the end of the week. Each child will take home a Lego superhero figure!
  - **Think Fun, Ignite the Mind (2:30-4:00 p.m.; grades K-3)**—The greatest logic camp ever is ready to take off—and ignite campers' problem-solving skills! The mission is to use science and logic to challenge the mind, encouraging creative thinking and problem-solving through some really fun games—including out-of-this-world challenges! This fun camp combines critical thinking, logic, and problem-solving to give little scientists a boost of 21st century thinking.
  - Special combination pricing is available for those who would like to participate in both camps.
- **BACK BY STUDENT REQUEST! Pokémon World Building (July 29-August 2; 1:00-4:00 p.m.; grades K-3)**—One of the elements of storytelling is world building. The ability to create characters, environments, and a set of societal rules is a part of the storytelling process, and this begins through adapting pop-cultural worlds and dissecting them through play. Students will use the popular Pokémon games and movies as a jumping-off point to create their own characters through both dramatic play and art projects. Engaging in favorite games such as capture the flag and dodgeball through the lens of becoming characters like Pikachu, Squirtle, and Charmander, campers will adopt elements or characteristics of their chosen character and look at how activities are changed when using those elements. Through fun scavenger hunts, craft projects, and science experiments, a created world will come to life.

Last month, I met with our Primary II students to ask them what they had enjoyed most in their time with us in the Primary School. There were lots of memories of special events, Chapel services, spending time with the big kids, and being with friends. I shared their favorite memories with the families who joined us for St. Francis 101 several weeks ago. This event is designed to give parents of students who will become new members of the Primary School insight into what the upcoming year will be like and what they can expect during these first years at St. Francis.

As we complete the school year, we want you to know that we are honored to be a part of this extraordinary time in your child's life. We believe that the experiences and growth that take place in these first years of school set the path for a lifetime of learning. ## Lower School

### **From the Division Head**

The end of a school year brings out many different emotions for every member of our school family. Even after 30 years as a teacher, coach, and administrator, emotions flood back for me each May.

Sadness, anticipation, and excitement are the emotions that many of us have been experiencing these last few weeks of school. So much growth has taken place, and so many wonderful relationships and friendships have been formed. Any time something special comes to an end, it is natural to experience a touch of sadness.

However, with every end is a new beginning and a time for new adventures! We have already been in full gear preparing for the 2019-20 school year. Our teaching teams are determined, our curriculum scope and sequence will be updated and documented before we leave for summer, supplies have been ordered, and yearlong division goals are set.

One of the most exciting things for us as a faculty at this time of year is the reflection process that takes place. All of us in some capacity are writing our self-study for our accreditation. This has facilitated extra reflection on many different levels. Similar to how we have taught our students to reflect in order to promote growth, our faculty spend the three days after Memorial Day reflecting on our curriculum, scope and sequence, and academic objectives. We create a living document that serves as our road map for the upcoming year. While everyone is tired and ready for a break, you would be amazed at how invigorating and collaborative this process is!

For faculty, summer is equally exciting because it offers the chance to spend time together learning, expanding our knowledge, and honing our craft.

- We have three teachers traveling to New York to Teachers College, Columbia University, for training in our workshop approach.
- Nine teachers are attending some wonderful training here in Houston, deepening our understanding of Reading Workshop, Guided Reading, and Accountable Talk in Reading Instruction.
- Four teachers are attending Responsive Classroom training in Austin, making our faculty 100 percent trained in this amazing, student-centered approach.
- Two teachers are attending *Bridges in Mathematics* training, one in Dallas and one in Denver.
- Our specialists and administrative team are traveling to Boston to attend a Learning and the Brain institute on Translating Psychology and Neuroscience Research in the Classroom.
- Seven teachers are attending the Texas Computer Education Association's Elementary Technology Conference in early June.
- One teacher is attending Rice University's Early Childhood Summer Institute on Reading, Writing, and Cultural Conversations, which is the foundation for our Primary School approach, and another is attending an Inquiry institute at Rice, as well.

Know that these days spent in training are days outside of their teaching contracts and days they choose to spend learning for your children.

As you can see, our Lower School faculty are extremely passionate learners. We will spend a great deal of time in the fall sharing our new learning and coaching one another on the most up-to-date pedagogical approaches. This new learning can be a springboard for new goals for the next year. This excitement for learning, for sharing, and for being our best trickles down to our most important constituents, your children.

As I close out my final *Wolf Watch* of the year, I leave you with a few reminders. Please help your child complete summer reading (posted on the Parent Portal), order your child's uniforms in plenty of time to come in before school starts, and watch for the early August e-mail outlining many important dates and events. As in previous years, the teachers will be calling their homeroom students on Monday, August 12, to welcome them back and to answer any burning questions.
