## A Message from the St. Francis Board of Trustees

We are pleased to report a very positive start to the 2019–20 school year. The St. Francis Board of Trustees typically welcomes new members each fall as we simultaneously thank outgoing members for their service. This year we would like to extend a warm welcome to our newest member, Maggie Stacy. Maggie currently serves as board president for the Ronald McDonald House and has professional experience as an executive recruiter. We would like to express our appreciation to departing board members Michael Jamieson, a nine-year veteran of the board; Greg Looser, who was instrumental in the Time to Grow capital campaign; and Courtney Robertson, former secretary of the board of trustees and leader in our capital campaign efforts. We are grateful for the time, talent, and treasure they have shared with our school. Our board strives to recruit members from a wide variety of professional backgrounds and experiences, and bylaws require that our board be composed of 60 percent Episcopalians and 30 percent St. Francis parishioners. Members of the St. Francis Board of Trustees are often asked about what we do and our role in the community. Simply put, board members serve as stewards of the school's resources. Our work is forward-looking and involves financial and strategic planning for the school, while the Head of School is responsible for the school's day-to-day operations.

In August, the board kicked off the new school year with an all-day retreat focused on the implementation of <u>St. Francis 2025</u>, the strategic plan that was presented to the community in the spring. As you hopefully heard in the September message from Head of School, Steve Lovejoy, we are excited to announce several initiatives that are in the process of being implemented. Curriculum and programming audits are underway, 1:1 technology implementation is rolling out in our Lower School, and several task groups have formed who will help evaluate the various goals to move implementation forward.

The Upper School initiative (goal 3 in the strategic plan, <u>St. Francis 2025</u>) is also experiencing positive momentum. We have been working to set Upper School tuition rates for the upcoming year. One of our top priorities is to keep our St. Francis students through high school, so we have set Upper School tuition at a lower rate for current St. Francis families. Additionally, we will be lowering the overall tuition rate for the Upper School program. We will be sharing more information with you all soon. We are excited about the growth and trajectory of our school and appreciative of the support of our St. Francis community.

# **Primary School**

#### From the Division Head

Denise Pope is a senior lecturer at the Stanford Graduate School of Education and co-founded Challenge Success. This Stanford-based organization focuses on a "broad definition of success and research-based strategies that promote student well-being and engagement with learning." Looking beyond grades and test scores, Pope believes that to raise resilient, ethical, and motivated learners, children need PDF every day: **p**laytime, **d**owntime, and **f**amily time.

Unstructured **playtime** that is initiated by the child and guided by his or her imagination makes it possible for children to build on their strengths and talents, and grow in areas that are still developing. Children need time, space, and the support of trusted adults to reach their potential. "Play and learning are not separate activities. They are intertwined. Think about them as a science lecture with a lab. Play is the child's lab." ("10 Things Every Parent Should Know About Play." The National Association for the Education of Young Children)

**Downtime** isn't just time spent away from school. Time away from planned extracurricular activities and sports is also necessary for children. Downtime is time spent at home or even in after-school programs or other places that gives children the opportunity for free play, relaxing, or other leisure activities that aren't planned by adults. Everyone needs downtime. When my children were young, we loved our weekend "nothing days." These were cherished days of sleeping a little later, playing outside, cooking together, and being spontaneous. We didn't know what would happen that day, but our goal was to not schedule anything.

Pope believes that **family time** is a priority for healthy development in children. She says that this should start with a tech-free mealtime for children and adults. "We are all glued to our phones way too much, and what we are finding is there is not enough face-to-face conversation happening, particularly at home."

Even though your children are in Primary School, you may have concerns about the development of their academic skills. When will they learn to read? Will they be ready for kindergarten? According to Pope, "our largely singular focus on academic achievement has resulted in a lack of attention to other components of a successful life—the ability to be independent, adaptable, ethical, and engaged critical thinkers."

As you consider how you can include **playtime**, **downtime**, **and family time** in your child's day, I hope you will think of the importance of PDF for you, too. As airline flight attendants remind us, "place the oxygen mask on yourself first." When you're strong and healthy, so are your children.

## Lower School

#### From the Assistant Division Head

This week, I wanted to continue the theme of building our students' self-advocacy, especially in regards to them reporting incidents or issues to their teachers when they occur. We work with our students regularly in this area, but we need your support at home to solidify these efforts.

We discuss with our students how important it is for them to have a voice in and ownership of their lives. Students need practice communicating with people who are around to support them, whether that support comes from teachers and administrators at school or parents/guardians at home.

It is also important for students to report incidents at school so we can problem-solve and start the conflict-resolution process as soon as possible. We want to support all involved students in a fair and respectful process. It is difficult for children to accurately recall what occurred when this process does not start immediately. Any delay can significantly impact our ability to help the students involved, especially those who may need guidance with behavior choices.

Speaking up for oneself is a skill we focus on from an early age. Many times, students are concerned about what others, especially their classmates, will think of them if they report incidents to their teachers. They worry others will think they are tattling on someone, or that their friendships could be affected. We spend a great deal of time coaching our students to seek "help" when needed and help them understand this is not just for them but also for the other student(s) who may have made a mistake or a poor choice.

At home, you can play a big part in your child's self-advocacy development. If your child reports an incident to you that occurred at school, share with them how important it is to get "help" from a teacher as soon as possible. Sharing a story about when you had to speak up for yourself and how the situation turned out is the best way to model appropriate self-advocacy strategies.

Ultimately, our students are going to grow into adults who will be responsible for their own lives. This is why we start the conversations/coaching early—to build their ability to self-advocate and feel empowered to stand up for what they believe is right. Continuing these types of conversations at home will help your child's growth in this skill and show him or her that we are all on the same team for promoting positive social-emotional development.

Thank you again for your participation in last week's student-led conferences. These conferences are a good opportunity for a student to reflect on her or his learning process and to share growth-minded goals with both the advisor and

parent(s) who, in turn, can provide ongoing support and encouragement toward the accomplishment of those goals.

Student-led conferences occur twice per academic year. Our next conferences will occur on Wednesday, January 15, 2020.

Prior to the January conferences, you will receive teachers' written narrative comments (in mid-October) and Trimester 1 grades (in mid-November).

Additionally, mid-trimester check-in conversations (between teachers and students) are happening now. Each student will have a conversation with all her or his teachers to learn about grades, performance strengths and challenges, and tools for improvement during the second half of the first trimester. If a student has an average of C- or below at the mid-trimester checkpoint, that student will receive an e-mail from the teacher. The parent(s), advisor, coach (if applicable), and I will be copied on the teacher's e-mail notification to the student. Please reach out to a teacher directly if you have any follow-up questions related to your child's performance in a particular class.

In closing, I wanted to share with you that I spent the second half of last week attending the Mastery Transcript Consortium's Member School Conference. I learned about some of the different ways our peer schools from across the country are redesigning the high school experience to develop and practice the core competencies students need for success in college and life.
