From the Division Head

Evidence of community emerges in many different ways when you learn and work in a place that has a mission to always think of others. During Wednesday's downpour, I grabbed my boots, jacket, and umbrella to assist with carpool. Following an extended, but safe, carpool, I reflected on all that transpired to make it efficient and comfortable for our families.

My first thought was how I observed teachers working in unison to make adjustments that would allow the day to continue, but also would support a natural course of movement that would keep students dry and traffic flowing.

First, teachers began using the porte cochere of the Primary II cottage, which is not used during our regular carpool routine. This allowed Primary II students to exit under the porte cochere, versus taking the small stroll from Primary I to Primary II in pouring rain.



Second, a Primary II teaching assistant grabbed an umbrella, and without prompting, began to direct traffic at the new carpool stop. His pants were drenched at the bottom, but he never wavered from his bright smile, with which he greets children and their families every morning.

Third, I observed thoughtful and kind teachers who were happy to receive the children on a very gloomy day.

Following carpool, I ventured to the cottages to say good morning to our students and teachers. On my way, and along the path of the large playscape, I returned to my childhood for a bit, as I made large splashes with my rainboots. I started thinking about what a mess it would be when the children came out to travel to enrichments.

Just as I began to wonder what I could do to help alleviate the possibility of wet shoes, I noticed a "bridge" on the walkway where some water had collected. Upon investigation, I was informed that Mrs. Agee's Primary I class had built the bridge with milk crates for the entire Primary School to use as a solution to water puddles on the path.



My heart immediately filled with joy at yet another example of how St. Francis cultivates a community where we are always considering others. I visited Mrs. Agee's class to

thank them for their ingenuity and praise them for creating something that would serve the entire Primary School. They were proud to be recognized as people for others.

It does not take much to think of others. These are a few examples of what it means to be a member of an incredible community where we show up every day ready to serve.

This is my final *Wolf Watch* submission before I leave for Holy Innocents' Episcopal School in Atlanta, GA. I would like to thank the entire St. Francis community for an amazing and memorable three years. You welcomed me with open arms into the community during a very strange and unpredictable time. Your kindness, love, and confidence in me never wavered, and as a result, I grew as a person and leader. I am grateful for your partnership and appreciate the many opportunities and experiences that were afforded to me during my tenure at St. Francis. I will miss the St. Francis Wolf Pack, but find comfort in knowing that once a Wolf, always a Wolf.

From the Division Head: Five Tips for a Great Summer

As the end of the school year approaches, I wanted to bring back a list of

recommendations I gave to our community last year. Here are five tips for a great summer:

#1: GET A JOB

As a parent, nothing was more profound in helping my children mature than getting their first job. My wife and I provided for our kids, but that wasn't the point. Maybe, actually, that was the point. They had grown up not having to worry about food, or housing, or even the private education we provided. On most days, this was a source of parental pride, but it also meant that there was a world out there of which my kids were unaware.

Going through the process of finding a job, interviewing, and being denied (or ignored) was critically important. Once they had a job, they learned to schedule their day, exchange shifts with other employees, receive consequences for being late, etc. They made their own money, and each child responded to this newfound commodity in his or her own way. They also met people different from themselves who had not attended private school.

For younger students, community service is a great way to start down this path.

#2: WALK OUTSIDE FOR 30 MINUTES A DAY

One of the hardest tasks we have on campus is controlling cell phone use. It's not uncommon to witness students walking into a static physical structure, like a pole or wall, or tripping over a parking curb because of their intent gaze on their phone. So much of their life is moderated by electronics. They go from one screen to another, and the white earbuds are ubiquitous companions as they navigate the archipelago of technology.

I want to make the audacious suggestion that every day, maybe right after lunch, they walk outside for 30 minutes unencumbered by any sort of tech. They walk slowly and inhabit the world around them. What do they see? What do they smell? Most importantly, when they are separated from the noise of the screen or some digital feed, what thoughts come unbidden to their minds? Things they did or left undone, friends, opportunities, or just a relaxing solace? What happens when they are all by themselves?

#3: READ A BOOK

I begin with a utilitarian appeal. On the SAT and ACT, reading comprehension is most clearly facilitated by reading. To use a metaphor, tutoring companies dress the edge of a blade, but they do not put the fundamental shape on it. The ability to take a test for hours (or, for extended time, a test that lasts for many more hours); the ability to build a vocabulary in excess of 30,000 or 40,000 words; the comfort that comes from constantly reading—all these derive from daily exercise.

The future of work is evermore becoming a service industry. Many jobs will soon be made obsolete through automated production or artificial intelligence. What remains are

the abilities to manage relationships and to communicate. Reading and writing skills will be paramount.

Beyond the utilitarian argument are two additional appeals. I've never been one to believe that the acquisition of knowledge and experience necessarily make one better. That, I believe, is an innate disposition. However, I strongly believe that reading increases perspective, whether the reader absorbs information from nonfiction or reads a novel. Getting into someone else's shoes, learning about different times and places—all of these help students to see the world differently.

I know that reading can be hard. I have often found myself snoozing or my mind wandering once I return to reading after having a significant break. It can be hard work, but patience and diligence will pay off.

#4: DO COMMUNITY SERVICE

One of our main commitments at St. Francis is to be "people for others." There is no better expression of this than to do community service. In the great city of Houston, there is always the opportunity to work in a food bank, walk a dog at a shelter, or just pitch in somewhere. According to Wordsworth:

The world is too much with us; late and soon, Getting and spending, we lay waste our powers.

It was his suggestion that we look to Nature. It's not a bad notion, but at St. Francis we ask that we also look to our neighbors to share our gifts.

#5: WRITE A LETTER

In this age of digital communication, it takes no time to send a text—literally seconds. Emails, which some treat in the same style of discourse as a text exchange, take hardly longer. They are quick and efficient. Sometimes, of course, it is an easy way to say hello or to wish someone well. I suggest that it means something more to spend some time writing a physical letter to someone. By sheer time investment, you are saying to the receiver, "You are worth more than 20 seconds of my time."

For the past two years, I have asked students to write letters of gratitude to people in our community. Teachers, coaches, and even administrators received letters of appreciation, which brightened their day. It also reminded our students of all that they have to be thankful for. Writing a letter to a distant relative, a grandparent, or a friend they haven't seen is such an act of personal kindness and investment. Letters are also mementos. Unlike texts or emails, they become treasured possessions to hold onto and reread when an occasion merits.
